In conjunction with our Bicentennial a "Walking Historical Tour of East Charleston Village" was held in June sponsored by the Society and the Vermont Leadership Center. Thanks to the tour guides, Don Griffes and Richard Colburn Sr. and all walkers.

Our annual meeting and open house was held in July and was attended by more than 60 people. The Museum was open Wednesday afternoons and at other times by appointment. In October two members were guests of the Morgan Historical Society Chili Supper and heard guest speaker, J. Kevin Graffagnino, the new director of the Vermont Historical Society.

Work has been ongoing through the fall and winter months with research,

cataloging, organizing, etc.

We are fortunate to have a "Graveyard Aficionado" in our midst. Richard Colburn Sr. has just completed compiling his 10th cemetery catalog. "A Catalog of Newark and East Haven Cemeteries" is now available.

Tentative plans are in the making for a yard sale this spring/summer. Also, we are looking for someone who might like to straighten the granite foundation blocks on the front side of the Museum.

BICENTENNIAL HIGHLIGHTS

Despite the stiff wind blowing as Jim Sloan and crew set the canopies the day before, and a showery forecast, July 12, 2003 dawned sunny and warm. People were already milling around as organizers and volunteers were setting up tables and displays. Many comments were heard concerning the size of the parade for our relative small community, from the color guard of American Legion Post No. 80 and VFW Random Post No. 2309 of Brighton to the grand finale, the delightful Mt. Sinai #3 Shriners Northeast Kingdom Fire Brigade in their miniature fire engines. In between were entrants which included band students from Charleston and guest schools, led by Charleston band teacher Steve Card, who also played the drum. Next came Grand Marshal and Charleston's most senior citizen, Harley Moulton, Sr., who turned down a seat in a convertible to ride in the passenger seat of his son Ronald's big blue dump truck! Floats included those from four of the town's five churches; North Country School of Dance; a Haunted House, Bits & Pieces 4-H Club; the Fontaine Family; re-enactors of the original settlers, the Abner Allyn family, sponsored by the Charleston Historical Society; and many more. Also in the parade were a pony cart, ATV's, all of Charleston's fire engines as well as one from Westmore, Brighton Rescue, Island Pond Lodge # 44 F&AM, and several local businesses and individuals.

Entertainment during the day was provided by Diane Colburn's North Country School of Dance, a sing-along led by Steve Card and accompanied by Jiggs Petit at the piano, a square dance exhibition by Bits & Pieces 4-H Club, the Ed Larkin Old Time Contra Dance Group, Steven Richard Lindholm, and a presentation by local Abenakis. Between these events one could participate in old-fashioned sack, three-legged, and wheelbarrow races directed by Jan Hogan; a hoop shoot supervised by Rev. Rick Smith; the Big Read Wagon Bookmobile; face-painting artist Delia (Whitlock) Lefebvre; balloon animals by Carolyn Heywood and Lorri Clapper; sales tables including baked goods, plants, crafts, and a huge flea market; pony rides courtesy of Marc Lacroix; and a children's games and activities area, just to name a few. Exhibits included Abenaki artifacts, wool spinning, the Vermont Leadership Center and the town's new planning committee. The historical society itself filled four large tables with calendars, information, souvenirs, and various drawings, raffles and door prizes, as well as souvenir programs containing several pages of photos and information (still available). Lunch was available in the form of hot dogs, hamburgers and salads, or the barbecued chicken prepared by and benefit of the Charleston Volunteer Fire Department. Estimates of the number attending ranged from around a thousand to perhaps twice that many.

The closing ceremonies at the end of the day featured special guests Governor and Mrs. James Douglas. A tenmember Combined Charleston Church Choir, directed by Steve Card and accompanied by Steve Rines, sang a medley of hymns during the program, and closed the day with a verse of "God Be With You Till We Meet Again". Grand Marshal Harley Moulton, Sr., just a couple of weeks short of his 97th birthday, was introduced and received a standing ovation. In attendance were eleven members of the Pothul and Moulthrop families, direct descendants of Abner Allyn. Greetings were read from two other descendants who were not able to be present, Evelyn Allyn McDonald and Anna Allyn Jardus. Senator Jim Greenwood spoke, and presented to the town a flag which had been flown over the state capitol at his request. Congratulations were offered on behalf of two invited guests who couldn't make it, Senator James Jeffords, and also Senator Patrick Leahy, who had a flag flown over the nation's capitol sent to the historical society.

The town's "unofficial" historian, Richard Colburn, Sr. was presented with a plaque honoring his service and dedication, as well as other gifts of appreciation, on behalf of the historical society and the Town of Charleston. Floyd Brown, select board chairman and president of the historical society, presented a plaque in appreciation to Bicentennial Committee chair Peggy Gray. Governor Douglas was presented with a denim gift bag made for him by Anne Allen,

which contained the souvenir booklet, a letter of thanks, other souvenirs, and a bottle of maple syrup donated by Keith and Teri Gray. He also received a potted perennial, a Dwarf Astilbe, grown and donated by Sue Dwelle and Tom Jensen at Crawford Hill Nursery, the original Lot #4 where Abner Allyn settled in 1803. In his remarks, Governor Douglas included the comment that the Charleston Bicentennial celebration should be "a model" for other towns.

It was a picture perfect day, and the best memories of all involved the spirit of cooperation and camaraderie among the Charleston residents and their guests. If the weather had been lousy, if the bills had been more than the receipts, and if everything else had gone wrong, the sense of good will and community would have been worth every minute of the year and a half of preparation that went into the event. The Charleston Historical Society, who sponsored the event, would like to thank the many volunteers who came early and stayed late to contribute to the day's success. We would also like to thank all who contributed financially, who donated prizes and other items, who worked behind the scenes ahead of time, and all of the guests who came and shared our celebration with us. So many were involved that names have no doubt been omitted, and to those folks we apologize. Everyone had a part in making this once-in-a-lifetime occasion unforgettable. Thank you all!!




